SUBJECT: Crew Comments and Suggestions.

TO : COMMANDING OFFICER, 401st Bombardment Group (H), APO 557, Sta. 128.
(Thru Lt. Col. A.C. Brooks and Lt. Col. W.T. Seawell.)

1. Major W.B. Fry, Group Intelligence Officer, flying as an observer in A/C 2917, complimented the excellent leadership of Capt. James F. Goodman, who led the Low Group of the 94th CBW. This statement was seconded by Lt. Gerald P. Carter, pilot A/C 2917 and Lt. Woodville G. Rossell, pilot A/C 7872. The crew of Lt. Richard H. Kaufman, pilot A/C 2394, observed that, instead of coming back alone, the Group might have tacked on to another B-17 formation.
2. Capt. James F. Goodman, Low Group Leader, stated that the large number of formations over Hamburg appeared to bomb at practically the same time.
3. Lt. Hodge E. Mason, navigator A/C 1730, noticed a number of gunners had left the ball and top turrets of A/C in the Lead Box one half hour before the English coast was reached enroute to England.
4. S/Sgt. Harris B. Griffiths, TTG 298, believes fuselage in front of top turret should be painted, in order to eliminate glare.
5. The crew of Lt. Ted D. Carroll, pilot A/C 7869, stated that B-24's were spread all over the sky after the target was bombed.
6. Lt. Edwin F. Sedlsk, bombardier, A/C 7962, has been on three missions and has had to crank bombbay doors up on every mission.
7. The crew of Lt. Francis S. Toussaint, pilot A/C 7487, enjoyed the fried eggs which were served at breakfast. This crew wants food served at interrogation, as does the crew of Lt. James P. Risher, pilot A/C 7322.
8. The crew of Lt. Kermit H. Opie, pilot A/C 1891, wants two day passes reinstated.
9. Lt. Edwin A. Post, pilot A/C 2674, reports that, when the chin turret guns in the A/C leading the Wing were test fired, a brass clip from the ammunition belt went through the plexi-glass nose of A/C 2674.
10. Lt. William H. McIlraith, pilot A/C 7113, stated that 2 friendly fighters made a playful pass at the tail of his A/C over the English coast enroute to Base, and that his gunners almost fired at them.

11. Transportation situation was bad, both at briefing before mission and at interrogation. One crew never did get transportation from their dispersal area to the interrogation and walked in carrying all their gear. Several crews waited for an hour or an hour and a half. Along this line, Major William C. Garland, 614th Operations Officer, suggests that in order to speed up matters after A/C land on return from mission, his Squadron will gladly furnish drivers if vehicles can be procured from transportation office, at least for the transport of their own crews. Failure of crews to report speedily to interrogation cause the interrogation to string out an hour longer than necessary.

MISSION SUMMARY REPORT

MISSION # 92.

Date 18 June 1944

ASSIGNMENT

1. Assigned Target: Hamburg, Germany.
2. Commitments: The 401st was to furnish 16 A/C (plus 2 spares) for the Lead box and 18 A/C (plus 2 spares) for the Low box of the 94th "A" CBW. 2 PFF A/C were furnished the Lead box by the 351st Group.

EXECUTION

401st Lead Box

1. Target Bombed: HAMBURG, GERMANY
2. Wing Leader: Major D. E. SILVER
Lead Navigator: Capt. H. D. WOOD
Lead Bombardier: Capt. D. W. FESMIRE
3. Takeoff and Assembly:

Takeoff was normal and assembly was made in good order, the 94th "A" CBW departing Deenetherpe on time. Point "Z" was passed three minutes early with all groups in formation.

4. Attack:

a. Penetration:

Although the route in was over a 10/10 undercast 6cc fixes and corrections brought the Wing over the penetration point approximately as briefed. However, due to the strong wind the point was reached about 15 minutes early. The high box had dropped somewhat behind but managed to catch up at the I.P.

b. Bombing Approach and Run:

As the I.P. was approached it was evident that the interphone was out in the lead aircraft - no contact could be made between pilot and bombardier, bombardier and navigator, etc, so the bombing run was turned over to the deputy. The run was made on PFF. Hits were observed through the clouds to be in the city.

c. Weather:

About 6/10 - 8/10 coverage from I.P. to target.

d. Withdrawal:

Withdrawal was normal and without incident, the route home was as briefed.

e. Return to Base:

Normal landing was made. All aircraft landing safely at home base.

401ST LOW BOX

5. Target Bombed: HAMBURG, GERMANY

6. Group Leader: Capt. J. F. GOODMAN

Lead Navigator: Capt. W. E. HABERER

Lead Bombardier: Capt. R. WOODHOUSE

7. Takeoff and Assembly:

Takeoff time was set back 30 minutes. Normal buncher assembly was made as briefed. All three groups were in Wing formation upon departure of Deenethorpe buncher. Assembly was good. A strong wind differential effected both high and low boxes on climb, and the high box dropped far behind as a result.

8. Attack:

a. Penetration:

Made lead fall on enemy coast as briefed. Route into target was good with lead box missing Blak areas. The code word for PFF bombing was given before I.P. I was a little in trail with high box. On turning at I.P. the low box crossed under the lead box to bomb from right position. The high box had crossed to the left but on the bomb run moved back to the right side. This put us in trail a short distance.

b. Bombing Approach and Run:

There was about 6/10 - 8/10 cloud coverage from the I.P. to the target so bombing was done in Wing formation, by means of PFF. A smoke screen was covering the target area so the ground could not be seen clearly even through the breaks in the undercast. Bombs from the Low box of the 94th "A" OBW were released on the smoke bomb which was dropped by the Wing Lead ship. Actual bomb strikes were unobserved.

c. Over the Target:

The low box had 18 ships over target. Formation was good. The target area was a mass of air planes. Several wings making bomb runs at the same time.

d. Weather:

Weather over entire route was 6/10 - 10/10 coverage.

e. Withdrawal:

Because of the confusion of planes in target area the low box became seperated and was unable to join the Wing on the way home.

f. Return to Base:

Returned to base flying parallel to B-24 wing. Group was held together until reaching field. Normal landing was made.

Your particular target in the target city is the largest of a complex of oil refineries and has an estimated capacity of 70,000 tons per year. Other units of this division are bonding the other refineries in the same target city. This large complex represents about $\frac{2}{3}$ % of the total capacity available to Germany according to June 9th, 1944 information. A variety of products natural to this type of plant such as lubricants, greases, asphalt, petrol, etc. Your particular target has a special plant for high grade petrol.

A smoke screen may partially obscure the target area and make identification of the W.P.I. difficult.

All of these refineries are located in the Central Dock area across the

large river ^{and} to the south of the main
built up area of the city proper. You will
notice, probably, a large lake about
2 1/2 miles NNE of the target.

WEATHER INFORMATION SUMMARY FOR MISSION OF 18 JUNE 1944.

BASE AT TAKE OFF: (0500) 9/10 plus stratocumulus base 2000 ft. Visibility 6 miles.

ROUTE OUT: 9/10 stratocumulus base 2000 ft tops 3-4,000 ft. over England becoming 9-10/10 cumulus and stratocumulus building to 10 to 12,000 ft over the North Sea; breaking at Danish Peninsula to 3-5/10 stratocumulus increasing again to 6-7/10 thin stratocumulus tops at 6-7,000 ft in the target area. 2-3/10 patchy alto cumulus at 12,000 ft over England becoming nil over the North Sea. 1-3/10 cirrus at 26 to 27,000 ft. Visibility unrestricted.

TARGET: (0939) 6-8/10 thin stratocumulus tops 6-7,000 ft. breaking to cirrus at 27,000 ft. ~~Lowest visibility~~ restricted by ground haze and smoke.

ROUTE BACK: 6-8/10 thin stratocumulus tops 6-7000 ft breaking to 3-5/10 at Coast and increasing to 8-10/10 stratocumulus at 05°30' E tops 7-8,000 ft breaking to 6-8/10 over English Coast tops 6-7000 ft base 3000 ft further decreasing and becoming 1/10 cumulus base 3000 ft over the Base area. 2-3/10 patchy alto cumulus at 12,000 ft over the Base area. 1-3/10 cirrus at 26-27,000 ft. Visibility unrestricted.

BASE ON RETURN: (1157) 1/10 cumulus base 3000 ft. 3/10 alto cumulus at 12,000 ft. 2-3/10 cirrus. Visibility 10 miles.

REMARKS: Contrails over target area only and were reported as follows: moderate non-persistent at the following altitudes 18-22,000 ft made by bombers, 25-27,000 ft by bombers, at 30,000 ft made by fighters. Winds were more easterly than forecast over the N. Sea; (20,000 ft 025° 70 knots) and were as forecast over England and Target. Temperatures over England were 2-4 degrees warmer than forecast (7000ft plus 3) and the forecast was good for temperatures over the Continent (25,000 ft minus 31 degrees).
